A jazz musician must "pay his dues of time and study before he can be considered great, Evans said. Evans will be a music professor at the University this se-mester. He has worked on his Ph. D. degree at Columbia University, having received a B.M.E. degree from Southeastern and an M. A. from LSU

Code Is to Hate Public

Jazz musicians ostracize embassaries of jazz, Evans said. The unwritten code is to hate the public and remain aloof, he said. $\hat{\mathbf{J}}azz$ got a break three or four years ago when it went on the concert stage. However, "hard core jazz musicians" are against this type of commercialization in the same way they will have little to commend about jazz embassaries, he

In Evans' opinion, a classical background is "absolutely essential." There must be form and discipline, he said. The jazz musician differs from the classical musician in that the former has "conquered time and meter" whereas the latter must adhere to the script, Evans explained.

Discipline Needed for Art

No art from has ever been built without some discipline, he said. If a person really wants to create something, he must have some skill at it. Evans said he felt it was only in the past three years of his score or more years of playing jazz that he had conquered
